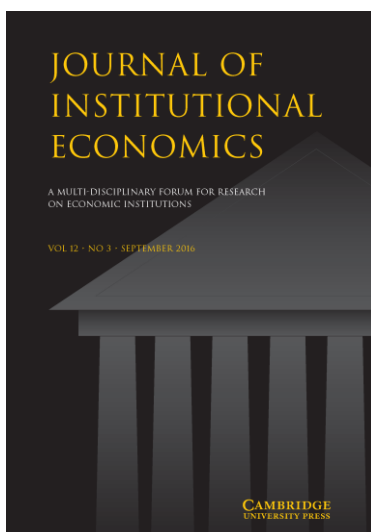
JOIE accepts **contributions by all schools of thought** that can contribute to our understanding of the features, development and functions of real world economic institutions and organisations.

Elinor Ostrom Prize

The **Elinor Ostrom Prize** has been established in honour of the late Nobel laureate Elinor Ostrom (1933-2012), who was an enormously creative scholar and an outstanding pioneer of the interdisciplinary field of institutional research. Her most famous work focused on the problem of managing and maintaining common-pool resources, but she also applied her ideas to problems of political governance and climate change. Her theoretical work on rules is of paramount importance. In her last decade she became increasingly interested in how rule-systems (or institutions) evolve.

Elinor Ostrom's articles published in *JOIE* are among the journal's most-cited papers, and are included in the Anniversary Paper Collection compiled by the editors to mark the 10th anniversary of *JOIE*.

A prize of £1000, funded by the Foundation for European Economic Development (FEED), **is awarded each year for the best full-length article published in *JOIE* in the preceding calendar year.**

For the **Elinor Ostrom Prize** awarded in 2016, the panel of experts comprising Bruno Amable, Christopher Coyne, Thráinn Eggertsson, William Milberg and Malcolm Rutherford, considered all full-length articles published in *JOIE* in 2015.

The winner of the 2016 Elinor Ostrom Prize will receive the award at the conference dinner in Boston.

Conference theme

It is now widely accepted that **institutions**, broadly defined as systems of established social rules, play a major role in explaining human behaviour.

Although scholars generally agree that institutions **coordinate human behaviour and to a certain extent mould it into recognizable patterns**, there is much less consensus regarding the precise mechanisms involved.

We also have yet to fully understand the ways in which **alternative rule systems and behavioural patterns emerge, persist and evolve to create our complex social systems**.

Theoretical and empirical research into these important topics needs to draw on insights from multiple academic disciplines, including anthropology, economics, ethnology, history, human geography, law, linguistics, management, philosophy, politics, psychology and sociology.

The aim of the **Third WINIR Conference** is to provide a forum for leading scholars from multiple disciplines and theoretical approaches to advance the **ongoing conversation** about these and other key issues in the **growing area of institutional research**.

Keynote speakers

Representing the disciplines of economics, sociology, philosophy and law, the **keynote speakers**, Daron Acemoglu, John L. Campbell, Margaret Gilbert and Henry Hansmann, have made **substantial contributions to interdisciplinary institutional research**.

Common threads in their research include the **influence of institutions on human behaviour**, the **institutional nature of economic and social reality**, and the essential roles played by **legal, political and social institutions** in enhancing or hindering economic performance.



Daron Acemoglu is the Elizabeth and James Killian Professor of Economics at MIT (USA). His research in microeconomics, macroeconomics and political economy emphasizes the role of institutions in economic development and growth. He is the author of *Economic Origins of Dictatorship and Democracy* (with James Robinson, Cambridge University Press, 2006) and *Why Nations Fail: Origins of Power, Poverty and Prosperity* (with James Robinson, Princeton University Press, 2012). He is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and was awarded the American Economic Association's John Bates Clark Medal in 2005. Professor Acemoglu is an Honorary President of WINIR.

John L. Campbell is the Class of 1925 Professor of Sociology at Dartmouth College (USA) and Professor of Political Economy at Copenhagen Business School (Denmark). His research spans economic and political sociology, comparative political economy, and institutional theory, and focuses on how institutions affect national political economies. He is the author of *Institutional Change and Globalization* (Princeton University Press, 2004) and an editor of *The Oxford Handbook of Comparative Institutional Analysis* (with others, Oxford University Press, 2010). His work has received a number of awards. Professor Campbell has served on the Executive Council of the Society for the Advancement of Socio-Economics.

Margaret P. Gilbert is the Abraham I. Melden Chair in Moral Philosophy at the University of California, Irvine (USA). Her research deals with the philosophy of social phenomena, in particular what she calls plural subject phenomena, as well as with ethics, and social and political philosophy. She is the author of *On Social Facts* (Princeton University Press, 1989), *A Theory of Political Obligation: Membership, Commitment and the Bonds of Society* (Oxford University Press, 2006), and more recently *Joint Commitment: How We Make the Social World* (Oxford University Press, 2013). Professor Gilbert is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and an Honorary President of WINIR.

Henry B. Hansmann is the Oscar M. Ruebhausen Professor of Law at Yale Law School (USA). His research focuses on the law and economics of organizational ownership and design, and more specifically on nonprofit organizations, and the relationship between contract law and organizational law. He is the author of *The Ownership of Enterprise* (Harvard University Press, 1996) and *The Anatomy of Corporate Law: A Functional and Comparative Analysis* (with others, Oxford University Press, 2004). He is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and a past president of the American Law and Economics Association. Professor Hansmann is an Honorary President of WINIR.
